- 1 Cold weather has a significant effect on how our minds and our bodies work, which is why
- 2 there are so many expressions that contain the word cold. Here are a few you may have
- heard. 3
- The first is *cold-blooded*. People who show no human emotions or feelings are said to be
- cold-blooded. In people's minds, blood has been linked closely with the emotions for
- centuries, and cold blood means a cold heart. Cold-blooded people can act in cruel ways.
- The second is cold feet. Cold can affect many parts of the body, including the feet. To get
- cold feet means being afraid to do something you had already decided to do. For example,
- you agree to be president of an organization, but then learn that all the other officers have
- resigned. You alone will have to run the organization for which you now have total
- responsibility. You are likely to get cold feet about being president when you understand 11
- how difficult the situation really is.
- Another expression is cold shoulder. Cold can also affect your shoulder. You give someone 13
- the cold shoulder when you refuse to speak to that person, and treat him or her in a way 14
- that is distant and cold. The expression probably comes from the physical act of turning 15
- your back toward someone whom you don't like, instead of speaking to him face-to-face. 16
- You may give the cold shoulder to a friend who has not kept a promise or to someone who
- has spread ugly rumors about you.
- Another is cold fish. A cold fish is not really a fish. It's a person who is unfriendly, 19
- unemotional and shows no love or warmth, like a cold, dead fish. A cold fish does not offer
- much of himself to anyone. Someone who is a cold fish could also be called "cold-hearted."
- Finally, out in the cold is another familiar expression. It means "not getting something that
- everybody else got." For example, a person might feel that he has been left out in the cold 23
- because everybody else at work got a raise, but he didn't. Or, a person might feel left out in 24
- the cold if he can't pass the entrance requirements for college. Being out in the cold is an
- unpleasant place to be.
