Matching Exercise: Subjects and predicates of proverbs

Instructions:

- 1. Duplicate the sentence subjects on colored paper, and the sentence predicates on paper of a contrasting color. Cut along the lines to make individual cards.
- 2. Distribute the cards with sentence subjects to half of the class, and the cards with corresponding sentence predicates to the other half of the class. (Give each student one card; set leftover cards aside.) Clarify the meaning of unknown words.
- 3. Students mingle with classmates who are holding cards of a contrasting color until they find a match that makes a complete proverb.
- 4. When students find a match, they confirm the match with the teacher and then walk to the front of the room with their partner. (Or they can "freeze" in place with their partner.)
- 5. Students read the proverbs aloud to the class.

Variation: Scatter the cards on a table. Students stand around the table and work collaboratively to match subjects and predicates.

Note: Each proverb is well known in the country listed below it. Of course, the proverb, or a version of it, might be well known in other countries as well.
